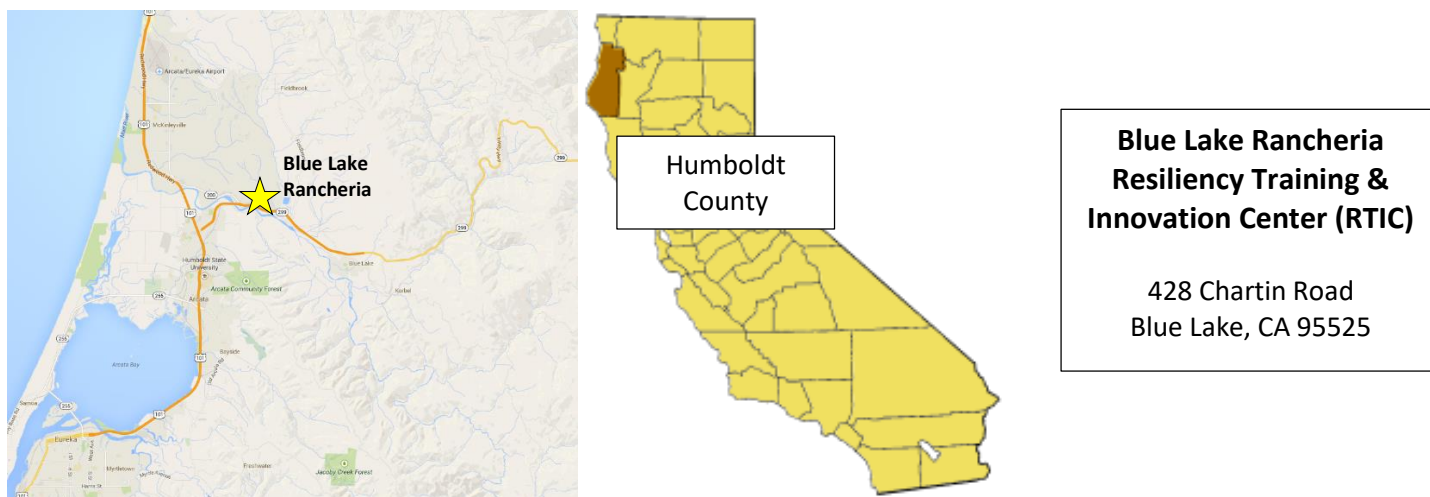

This is a one-day (8-hour) course.</p>	<p>The Tactical Medical for First Responders program is designed to define a Medical Threat Assessment, to include a medical plan for a tactical operation. Students will learn how to apply techniques to control life threatening bleeding during Care under Fire in a (HOT ZONE). Additionally, they will perform techniques to treat life threatening and non-life threatening injuries during Tactical Field Care in a (WARM ZONE). During the program students will demonstrate lifting, moving and extricating victims from a tactical or hostile environment during Tactical Evacuation Care. This course format is designed to facilitate both full-time as well as volunteer SAR Management personnel, it includes the NASAR “Managing the Lost Person Incident” text, and the most revised and updated course curriculum. DIRECTIONS: The Blue Lake Rancheria RTIC is located in Humboldt County, California on State Route 299 east. Take the Blue Lake Exit (Exit 5) onto Blue Lake Blvd. Turn right at the round-about and follow Chartin Road straight into the Blue Lake Rancheria.

Council Chambers: Council Chambers located on 4th floor of the Blue Lake Casino Hotel at 777 Casino Way. From Elevator in Hotel Foyer: Take elevator to 4th floor. Get off the elevator at 4th floor, turn left and go almost to end of hallway. Council Chambers on your left.

Sapphire Palace Event Center: 777 Casino Way. Enter main entrance to the Blue Lake Casino and turn left. Continue straight ahead to the tiled floor area near the Redwood Rewards Club and turn right through the glass door(s), into the Sapphire Palace Event Center.

Tribal Justice Center: 1 Ayekwee Loop. Enter main entrance Blue Lake Rancheria. Take Batwot Drive past gas station and continue through to Rancheria Road. Turn right at Rancheria Road through the open chain link gate. Straight ahead to the new Tribal Justice Center on right, near fire department. Entrance on north side of building where electric car chargers are at.
